On this cloudy but mild day we recorded 81 species and 9037 individuals. Highlights Denis Knopp reported: Canada Goose 1665, Green-winged Teal 226, Cooper's Hawk 6, Eurasian Collared-Dove 101 Northern Pygmy-Owl 3, Anna's Hummingbird 11, Belted Kingfisher 19, Downy Woodpecker 26,

Northern Flicker 69, American Kestrel 3, Peregrine Falcon 3, Northern Shrike 4, Ruby-crowned Kinglet 20, Goldencrowned Sparrow 42, House Finch 116, Purple Finch 48, and Snow Bunting 18. -Your editor's highlight was a Barn Owl called out after dark by my new "Merlin" app The locked barn prevented daytime viewing this year.
