1. Tuesday, March 21, 2017 AGM

Eddie Gardner, a Stó:lō Elder from the Skwah First Nation in Chilliwack B.C., is elder-in-residence with University of the Fraser Valley. Eddie informed us about the health risks and the threat to wild salmon posed by net-pen fish farms.

2. Tuesday, April 18, 2017

Five students from BCIT reported results of a comparative study of Wells Sanctuary and Camp Slough, two Nature Trust of BC properties. CFN has stewarded Camp Slough since 1994. Results showed five species of small mammals at Camp Slough, 791 fish and still lots of blackberries.

1. Great Blue Heron Reserve March 26, 2017 Six CFN members joined EFVNature Kids at the



Great Blue Heron Nature Reserve for a talk by Metis leader, Joe Smith, on edible and

medicinal plants. Big thank you to Alena McIlroy, EFV Nature Kids leader, for welcoming us. Joe made a tea from plants in his garden and Alena provided cottonwood buds, which were added to olive oil to make a soothing rub for aching joints and muscles. After the talk we 6 walked to the heronry to observe about 100 nesting herons. We ended our day over lunch and coffee in the Rotary Reception Building.  water of the Hope Slough.
- 3. Field Trips This coming year your executive is coordinating speakers and field trips. On May 6 it's Camp Slough as follow-up the BCIT study. A local school class is studying tracks so we may see some of their activities too. After Dennis St. John's butterfly presentation, we go June 2nd to the Skagit, a prime butterfly area.
